

## Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has passed an amendment to the Shade Tree ordinance. A permit is now required before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in

caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private property and to town trees. Before any tree can be removed, the homeowner or contractor needs to get a permit from the Building Department. There is a fee of \$25.00. Following the application for a permit, the Dumont Shade Tree Com-

mission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed.

The application process will be completed within 5 days of the application request.

### Adopt-a-Tree Green Neighborhood Program

Dumont Shade Tree Commission is accept-

ing applications from specific neighborhoods to participate in the Adopt-A-Tree program.

If accepted, certain homes within a chosen neighborhood will receive a new healthy 8-12' tree. The Shade Tree commission will purchase and plant these trees at no cost to the homeowner. There is a catch, however; a minimum of 4 homes in the neighborhood must apply for the trees in order to be considered for the program.

Once the trees are planted the homeowner must agree to water and watch over the new trees.

Simple as that. Interested in seeing your street become a **Green Neighborhood** community?

Call us or send an email to let us know you want to be a *Green Neighbor*. *Limitations and restrictions may apply*. Planting trees in the Borough Right of Way is the sole responsibility of the DSTC. Planting subject to available nursery stock. *Green Neighborhood* program administered by DSTC while supplies last.

## Happy Trees... Happy Homeowners!

Trees need to be cared for in the summer to guarantee their well being. They provide shade in the hot sun and soak up the water in the rain, keeping your basements dry. Regular pruning removes potentially hazardous dead or weak branches and keeps trees strong. However, don't over prune. Mulching adds visual appeal and also can help protect trees. Surround the base with 1- to 3-inch depth of mulch to conserve moisture within the soil and keep the tree moderately cool for the roots. Water appropriately. Don't Overwater! Run a sprinkler to wet the ground under the leafy umbrella for an hour once a week in dry spells, but don't water the leaves! Lack of water can be harmful to trees, especially newly planted trees, and can cause serious, irreversible harm growth. Make sure you are watching your trees for signs of trouble. If you are unsure, call an expert.
